Dearest Friends,

Bem-vindo a Portugal!

How happy I am to be once again inviting you to our General Assembly. And this will not be just any General Assembly! This indeed will be our 25th Silver Jubilee GA and *that* is worth celebrating!

Évora is a beautiful UNESCO cultural site with Medieval walls and a Roman temple and is located 130km east of Lisbon. We shall gather for a warm welcome on June 9 in the cloister of the Convento do Espinheiro, previously a convent with an important religious heritage. It is also here that the General Assembly will take place the following day with the theme "*Landowners Committed to Biodiversity: using Creative Solutions*". Following the GA, we are launching the idea of a workshop entitled "*The Generational Handover*" for both Friends and Young Friends with various discussion panels. The Gala dinner that Friday will be presided by T.R.H. the Duke and Duchess of Bragança.

You will have a variety of Tours to choose from on Saturday that include a wine estate that has branched out to develop a contemporary art collection and restaurant, the full story of how wine bottles are corked at Amorim, a 16th agricultural retreat with a Baroque chapel set in 300 ha of cork forest, ancient olives and grazing land for sheep and black Iberian pigs, a marble quarry, and the best of Alentejo countryside from water management to successful estates. For the informal dinner that evening we shall certainly have a regional wine tasting session!

We are also organising a special Welcome Pre-tour around Lisbon for a smaller group of 30 Friends to stay at Herdade de Pinheiro, a Wildlife Estate Label and a visit to Comporta. A highlight will be the Post-tour to Sao Miguel Island in the volcanic Azores for a group of 40 to witness nature in its purest state. Staying at 3 different hotels to benefit from the different landscape, activities will include meeting with entrepreneurs and officials, discussions with farmers, visits to local landowners, thermal baths, terra nostra gardens, tea and pineapple plantations and the essential whale watching!

Alentejo and Évora THE REGION

AGRICULTURE

Évora is the capital of the Alentejo region, whose name means "beyond the Tagus river". It is a beautiful region of undulating green hills and picturesque villages of white houses with terracotta roofs. The region is referred to as "the breadbasket" of Portugal, thanks to its rich soil and excellent irrigation. The main areas of agriculture are **cork forestry and production, wines, olives, almonds, cereals and citrus fruit**. Mining is also an important part of the economy as it is the marble quarried near Estremoz.

Alentejo is the world's most important area for growing cork oak, or "sobreiro" in Portuguese and cork forests are protected by law. As the areas surrounding the trees are usually given over to grazing, unique ecosystems of livestock, citrus trees, vines or olives have formed in these forests. The bark is still harvested by hand to this day by teams of men with hand-axes stripping the tree off their bark.

Due to its position inland, the region is often subject to heat waves and typical summer temperatures can reach up to 40 degrees. The water reserve from the huge Alqueva dam that was completed in 2002 serves as a guaranteed water supply for irrigation and domestic use.

HISTORY

From the rise and fall of ancient Rome to the catastrophes of the 20th century, Évora is a city that has lived to see many changes, with a history spanning almost five millennia. Its historical centre has been declared a UNESCO World Heritage site and hosts an old medieval wall protecting the city, a Roman temple and a medieval aqueduct.

Évora is ranked the second most livable city in all of Portugal, combining new and old, and is a regional capital that bustles with life and culture.

Having survived for five millenia, it comes as no surprise that the history of Évora has been tumultuous. The name itself is said to have celtic roots, possibly stemming from the word for "yew tree", giving Évora the meaning "place of yew trees". It was brought under Roman control, of which the main monument is the impressive Roman Temple. Thanks to the city's beneficial position at the junction of several important trade routes, it expanded into a walled city.

In the 8th century Évora, or Jabura as it was then called, fell under Moorish dominion, together with much of the Iberian peninsula. They made considerable efforts to build upon the defences of the city by fortifying the protective Roman walls and establishing a Kasbah.

The city was reconquered by the Christians in II56 and construction began soon after of the cathedral. Portugal became a major colonial power from the 15th century during the Age of Exploration. Kings of Portugal began to live in Évora with increasing frequency and the city entered its golden age. Numerous buildings were constructed to signify this era, among them the St. Claire Convent, the royal palace and various other notable convents. Over the centuries, Évora became a hub of art, religious influence and architecture.

In more recent history, the Franco-Spanish invasion in 1807 sparked off the Peninsular war, part of the Napoleonic Wars, with the resulting joint Franco-Spanish occupation of Portugal and the fleeing of the court to Brazil. At the Battle of Évora, over 8000 people were slaughtered (while the French lost 290 soldiers of their own). By 1811 the French were driven out.

Today, the city is known for the various monuments that mark the different eras of Portugal, and indeed Europe as a whole, its wine, as well as being a very attractive place to live.

BLUE TOUR: "HERITAGE AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP"

Herdade do Outeiro de Esquila: (15km from Évora).

Owner and Young Friend *Hein van Beuningen* welcomes us to his beautiful estate for a coffee break and introduction to his development business. Hein's father Herman, a member of the Friends, shall also accompany the group.

Herdade Castelo Ventoso: (15km from Évora).

A 16th century Jesuit agricultural retreat with a Baroque chapel set in 300 ha of cork forest, ancient olives and grazing land for sheep and black lberian pigs. The housing is being converted into a high end private location for business off sites, weekly rentals and small intimate events. There are also several residences for long term rentals. The property is owned by the *van Beuningen and Ramos* families.

We will visit the main house, chapel, gardens and the cork farm and enjoy lunch here with our host Hein van Beuningen.



Quinta Dona Maria vineyards

Wine has been produced in this domain for more than 150 years. The current owners *Júlio and Isabelle Bastos* started in 1988 to market nationally and internationally the high quality wines produced using the treading technique at this Quinta.

The group will enjoy a wine tasting.

YELLOW TOUR: "VINEYARDS, ART AND GASTRONOMY"

Quinta do Quetzal wine and art + almond and olive farm 60km south of Évora.

The present estate was founded by *Cees and Inge de Bruin*. Manager *Reto Frank Jörg* will accompany the group the whole day.

Wine production on the rich slopes of the Vidigueira with a microclimate of the foothills of the Serra do Mendro and soils rich in schist to produce a limited production of concentrated top quality wine. In 2016 a new building covered in schist plates with a contemporary restaurant and shop as well as a renowned art centre with an annual contemporary art exhibition was opened by *Aveline de Bruin*, daughter of Cees and Inge. At the time of the visit, the exhibition will be: "Thru The Mirror - What is a cartoon if not a mirror?". Quinta do Quetzal was awarded the Best Restaurant Award, Alentejo 2018 and Best Wine Tourism Award, Alentejo 2017. The group will enjoy a gastronomic lunch prepared by Michelin starred chef *Pedro Mendes*.

After lunch, a visit to an almond and olive farm.

GREEN TOUR: *"FROM BARK TO BOTTLE"*

Amorim Florestal & Equipar, Coruche.

Owner Antonio Amorim is closing the Friday conference.

An in depth presentation of the manufacturing process of the cork industry from "bark to bottle" from the largest cork producers in the world!

The group will stop on the way to Coruche to a cork tree plantation to observe the cork harvest underway as well as a visit to an oak nursery with its special irrigation process. In Coruche, a visit to the raw-materials preparation unit, Amorim Florestal, to see how the cork planks (bark) coming from the forest are processed. At Equipar, belonging to the cork stopper division the group will witness how the planks are manufactured into cork stoppers for table wine (shanks and discs). 10 million cork stoppers are produced ... a day!

All the waste cork resulting from the industrial process is reintroduced into Amorim's raw-material supply to other units making different cork applications (flooring, memo boards and even components for space vehicles, etc.).

Amorim motto is "nothing is wasted, everything is transformed" ... cork dust included!

Lunch will be served at Quinta Grande.

Quinta Grande is a centennial family company established in the early 20th century by the first Viscount of Coruche. He planted vineyards, employing modern techniques at the time, to achieve his dream of becoming a winemaker. Although he did not witness that milestone during his lifetime, Quinta Grande has become the place of choice for the nature of Ribatejo to spread its full essence.

70 km from Lisbon, it inspires those that come and no longer wish to leave, with abundant nature and fertile plains where rice is grown, but also vineyards, horticultural products, and a wide forest area of stone pine, clearly dominated by cork oaks.



RED TOUR: "ALENTEJO, A UNIQUE REGION"

Ganaderia Murteira Grave, the Algueva Dam & Herdade de Esporao.

Ganaderia Murteira Grave

The Ganaderia Murteria Grave estate was founded by Manuel Joaquim Grave (grandfather of the current owner Joaquim Grave) in 1994. At Galeana, the bulls can be admired in all their splendour. The visit will include a briefing explaining the location of the estate, the way the bull is raised and the management of the estate and will show the lives of the bulls and cows on the estate while towed by a tractor. It will also include, exclusively for the group, a bull show in the newly built arena. The group shall be hosted by current owner and previous forcado Joaquim Grave. Lunch will be served in the Souvenirs Room.

The Algueva Dam

On the way to and from Ganaderia Murteria Grave, you will cross the Alqueva Dam - breathtaking in its beauty. Lying on the River Guadiana, this arched dam was financed by the European Commission and completed in 2002 to create the largest artificial lake in Europe (250km²). The lake allows the irrigation of 120,000ha of land and the production of a reversible hydroelectric power station (518 megawatt) as well as outdoor activities and water sports. As a water reserve it has met the needs of at least 3 years of drought.

Herdade do Esporão (if time permits).

Part of the Alentejo's montado ecosystem (cork oak forests), in Portugal, Herdade do Esporão has extraordinary conditions for agriculture. With approximately 700 hectares of vineyards, olive groves and the other crops they grow using organic methods and integrated production. With around 40 grape varieties, 4 types of olive, orchards and kitchen gardens. The production of Esporão's olive oils comes from the will to apply the knowledge obtained in the production of wines into the production of high quality olive oils. All oils, exclusively extra virgin or virgin, are produced using natural methods and entirely traditional processes, preserving the pure juice of the harvested olives. The visit will include a guided tour of the winery and tastings of Esporão Colheita White & Red.

Visiting the Cadaval Palace is to feel up close what is also the history of Portugal. The ancestral home and the property of the Dukes of Cadaval family, since its foundation in the 14th century until today, the Palace was built on the ruins of a Moorish Castle in the heart of Évora, and has been able to extend itself over time in all its essence through careful intervention programs.

Located in front of the Roman Temple, the Palace is a singular example of the country's architectural heritage, resulting from a unique combination of Mudéjar, Gothic and Manueline styles. The building's body includes a vast multi-storey residential area, two interior gardens and a church that is the final resting place for every generation of the Dukes of Cadaval family. The church is, moreover, a national reference given its stunning interior, where azulejo tile panels signed and dated from the beginning of the 18th century prevail.

Martim Afonso de Melo, noble servant of the Grand Master of the Order of Aviz and descendant of the Portuguese royal family, commissioned the building, then designated the Palace of the Tower of the Five Shields. The Palace served as the temporary residence of the monarchs Dom João II, Dom João IV and Dom João V. The Palace was also used to imprison the Duke Dom Fernando II of Braganza, accused of conspiring against King Dom João II and subsequently beheaded in the Praça do Giraldo, in Évora, in 1483. Today the Palace remains the residence of the Dukes of Cadaval, although the church and some of the rooms are open to the public throughout the year, exhibiting a collection of historical and contemporary pieces from the family: books, charters, armoury, painting, sculpture, furniture, porcelain, portraits and travel accessories, among other objects of value and major historical interest. At the same time, the Palace will host a wonderful exhibition which will surprise you.



ORANGE TOUR: YFCS "VISION FOR THE FUTURE"

Monte Da Serralheira (Évora)

Introduction to Farming and entrepreneurship and settling in Alentejo. We shall be welcomed by Dutch couple *George and Lucia van der Feltz* who settled on this farm over 40 years ago. George will present the New Holland Braud's machinery that harvests the grapes, olives and even almonds. Lucia, who is an official guide of Evora, will discuss settling in Portugal as foreigners.

João Portugal Ramos • Vila Santa winery (Estremoz - 45 km from Évora).

Designed in accordance with the traditional architecture of the Alentejo region, Vila Santa winery has put Estremoz on the map of the great wines, welcoming visitors from all over the world. The group will start with a delicious rustic lunch served with Portugal Ramos wines and will enjoy a tour of the wine estate and production facilities where wine is still treaded in marble vats!

TUESDAY, June 7

Morning

08:30am Departure for Comporta via Setúbal and by ferry.

We may have a chance to spot dolphins (Bottlenose dolphin - *Tur-siops truncatus*) in the Estuary. The first scientific records about the dolphins in the Sado estuary began in 1980. The resident population currently stands at about 30 dolphins: 22 adults, of which 8 females, 5 males and 9 of whom the sex is as yet known. 4 Juveniles and 4 calves complete the population.

It is the only resident population of dolphins around Portugal and one of the 3 in all Europe, hence the need for so much protection and studies that aim for their well being and conservation.

11:00am arrival in Troia.

The bus will bring us to the Roman ruins of Troia for a visit with archaeologists working on the site. We will travel back in time, discovering Acala island, as it was known in the days of Ancient Rome located a few minutes from Troia's central area. We will visit the ruins of the largest center of the fish-salting industry from the times of the Roman Empire until the 6th century and wander among the ruins of factories, tombs and tubs for hot and cold baths. New vestiges are being discovered every year. 12:30pm Lunch at Carvalhal beach at the Sublime Beach club.

Comporta is renowned for its wild and unspoilt natural landscape, peaceful atmosphere and charming traditional villages. The magnificent beaches that stretch along more than 60 km of coastline are undoubtedly one of its main assets. The beaches of Comporta are indeed covered with a fine white sand that contrasts with the deep blue of the Atlantic ocean and the dunes covered with vegetation.

Afternoon

Visit **Herdade da Comporta** - Actividades Agro Silvícolas e Turísticas, S.A.

One of its goals is to develop a high-quality tourist destination and become a model for sustainable development in Europe, while still operating as an agricultural estate and preserving its environmental and cultural heritage. Herdade da Comporta intends to continue to diversify its agricultural activity, already present in its rice, wine and horticulture production, and so follow the new tendencies for a more ecological food production, together with the establishment of the "Herdade da Comporta" brand. On the other hand, the economic activity arising from the tourism project offers the conditions necessary to support a strategy of preservation and appraisal of natural heritage.

Stop at the typical fishing spot: Porto Palafita da Carrasquiera.

Arrival and installation at Herdade do Pinheiro. 08:30pm Dinner at Herdade do Pinheiro.

The estate includes a stud farm, cattle, forests, agriculture, a bird sanctuary and natural reserve. The estate has been developed recently to hold conferences and business meetings.

The Comenda Grande agricultural project was launched by *Maria José de Almeida Margiochi*, granddaughter of José Maria Eugénio de Almeida (who set up the **Eugénio de Almeida Foundation**) and daughter of Gertrudes de Almeida Margiochi and Francisco Simões Margiochi, the latter one of the most renowned figures in 19th century Portuguese agriculture, picking up countless national and international awards and prizes for his farming related activities.

This landmark estate was inherited by Maria Madalena de Noronha and her husband João and today continued by their daughter *Maria de Lourdes S.A. de Noronha Lopes*, her husband, engineer *António Lopes*, and their children across an area spanning 750ha. They accompany the reconversion process undertaken by the Alentejan agricultural sector and have made significant investments to this end. This involved expanding the forested areas, incorporating part of the rain-fed lands into the irrigation system, prioritising the cork oak mostly cork oak Quercus Suber as well as installing 43ha of vines on outlying fields and planting a modern olive grove over around 30ha. The whole family is today involved in the business.

4:30pm Stop on the way to Évora at Herdade Freixo do Meio.

The estate goes back in time to find the best associations of plants to manage the Montado. More than organic agriculture, it is agroecology. The team will explain all we need to know about agroforestry. They farm and produce more than 300 quality, healthy and fairly priced organic and handmade foods. We will learn where the food comes from, how it is produced and processed and enjoy a presentation on Sharing the Harvest CSA Program - home delivered baskets of a selection of vegetables, meat, eggs, fruit, and more.

AZORES - SAO MIGUEL ISLAND

The Azores is one of two autonomous regions in Portugal along with Madeira, and comprises nine volcanic islands. Its history is vague, but what historians can be sure of is that Europeans had knowledge of the islands according to a map from 1375, but they were not claimed or populated until 1427. There are carvings that may imply human presence as late as 2000 years ago, but this is hotly debated among historians. Nowadays, the islands are well-populated and thrive on tourism and agriculture. About 10% of the landmass has been cultivated, mostly for potatoes, maize, taro and other crops. A staggering 88% of the land are permanent grasslands, perfect for grazing livestock like cows or sheep.

São Miguel Island, nicknamed "The Green Island" (Ilha Verde), is the largest and most populous island in the Portuguese archipelago. The island covers 760 km² and has around 140,000 inhabitants, with 45,000 people residing in Ponta Delgada, the archipelago's largest city.

We have set up a programme with friends living and working in the Azores for a personalised and exclusive discovery of the island from north to south and east to west.

We will meet with key actors for farming, the environment, tourism and development. Descriptions of the estates below are limited - what is to be marvelled at is the landscape, abundant vegetation and flowers, colours, volcanic atmosphere, wild ocean and immersion in nature in its purest state. It is something totally unique !
